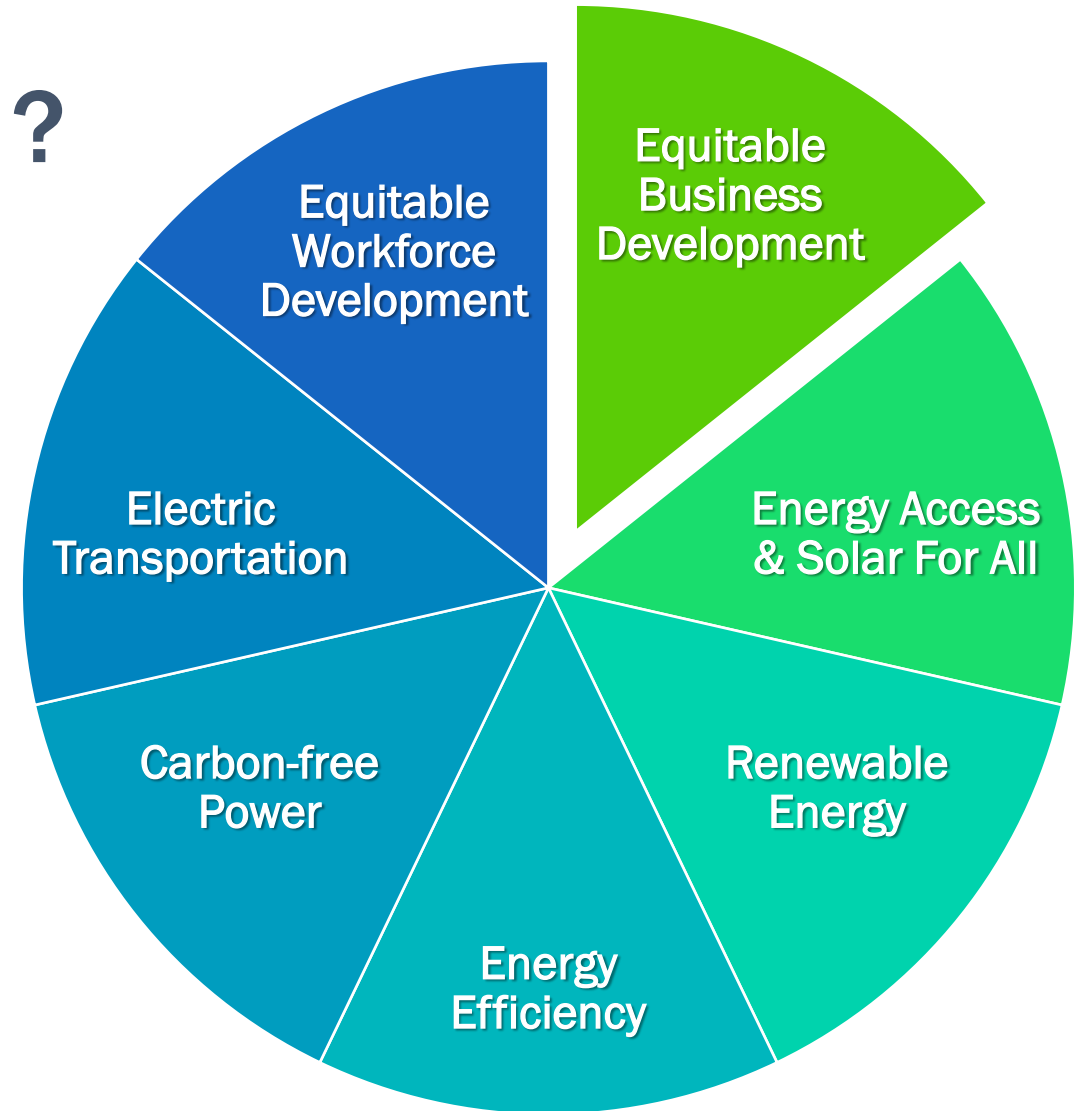

What is the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA) ?

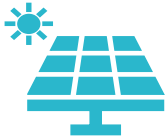
Comprehensive energy legislation that centers equity and puts Illinois on track to achieve 100 % clean energy by 2050.

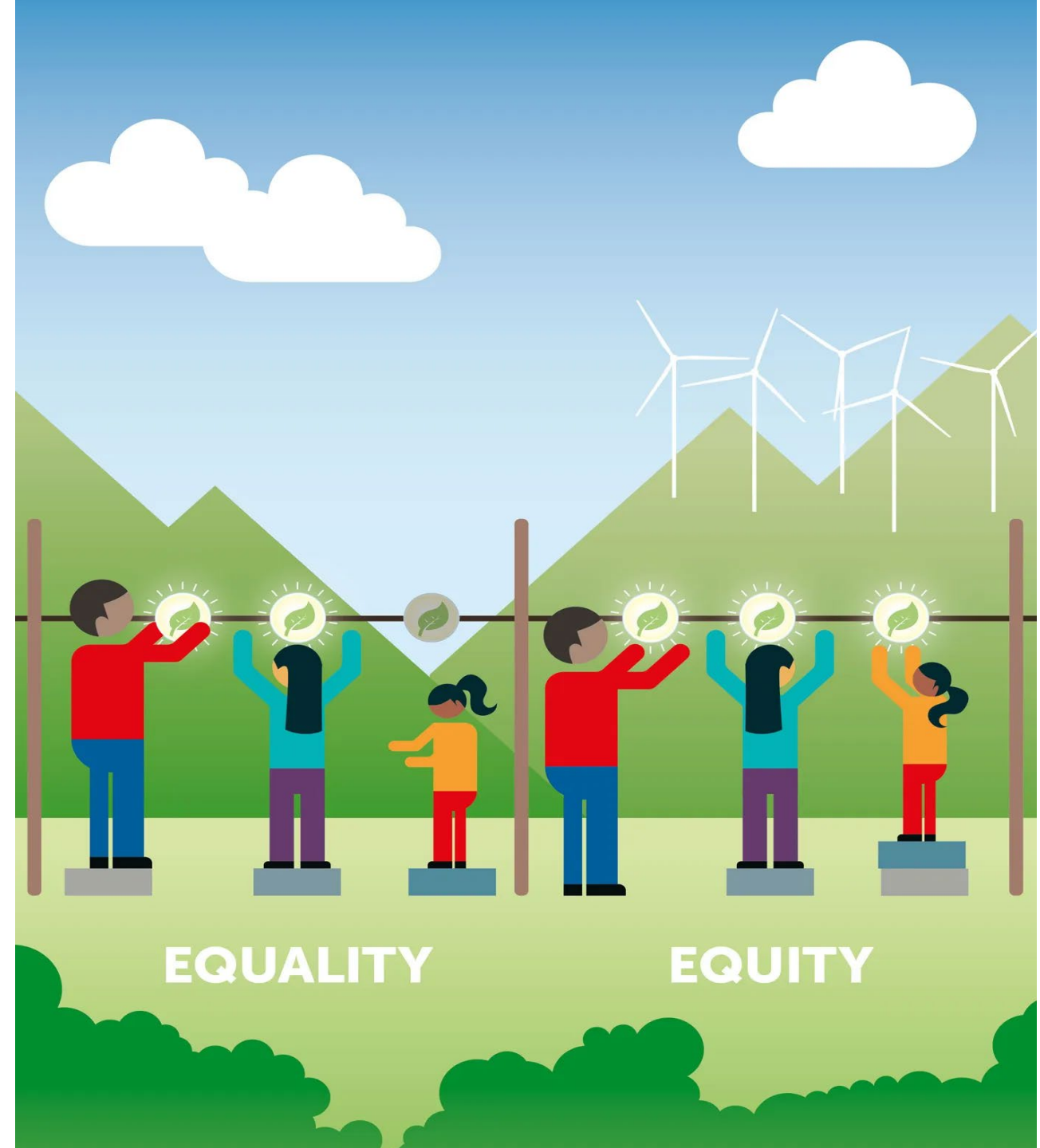
Some groups of people and communities benefit more from clean energy investments while some others suffer more from environmental impacts & community disinvestment.

EEF offers pre-development funding to support the development of renewable energy & energy efficiency projects.

The goal of EEF is to remove barriers to project, community & business development caused by lack of capital.

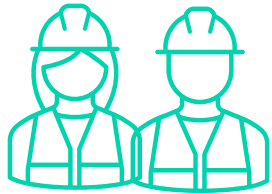

- **An Illinois business, non-profit, or cooperative organization that meets equity-building criteria.**

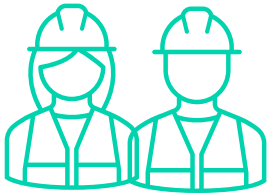

Equity Eligible Contractors

At least 50% of ownership/partner/proprietor, board must meet one of the qualifications below:

1. Persons who graduated from or are current or former participants in a CEJA Workforce Development Program, the Solar Training Pipeline, or Multi-Cultural Jobs Program
2. Persons who are graduates of or currently enrolled in the foster care system
3. Persons who were formerly incarcerated
4. Persons whose primary residence is in an equity investment eligible community

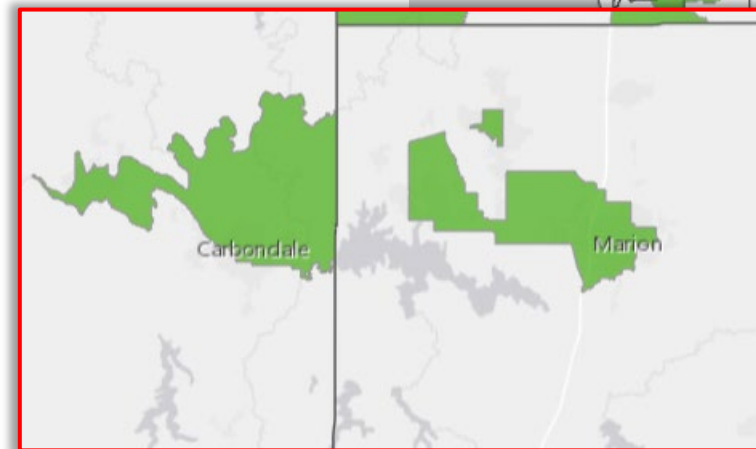

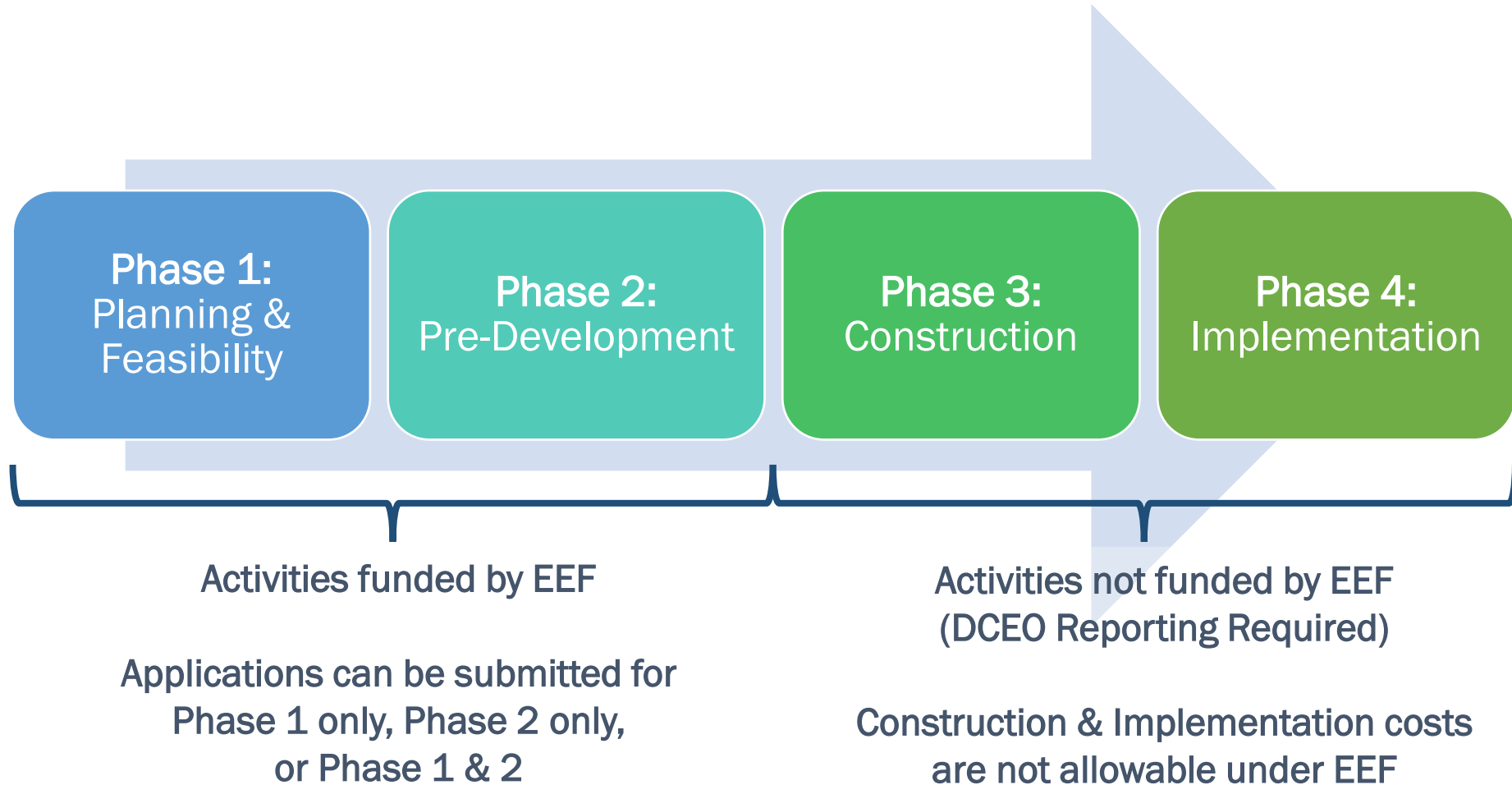
- **Total Funding:** \$25.5 million per year
- **Per Applicant Award:** \$250,000 - \$1,000,000
- **Estimated Number of Awards:** Up to 40
- **Applicants may apply for multiple projects.** However, applicants will only be approved for a total award amount of funds up to \$3 million between all projects.
- **Applicants may apply for both EEF and CSES.** However, they can only receive a maximum award between EEF and CSES of up to \$3 million.

Priority projects are those located in or supporting an equity investment eligible community.

- Environmental Justice communities
- Restore. Reinvest. Renew (R3) communities

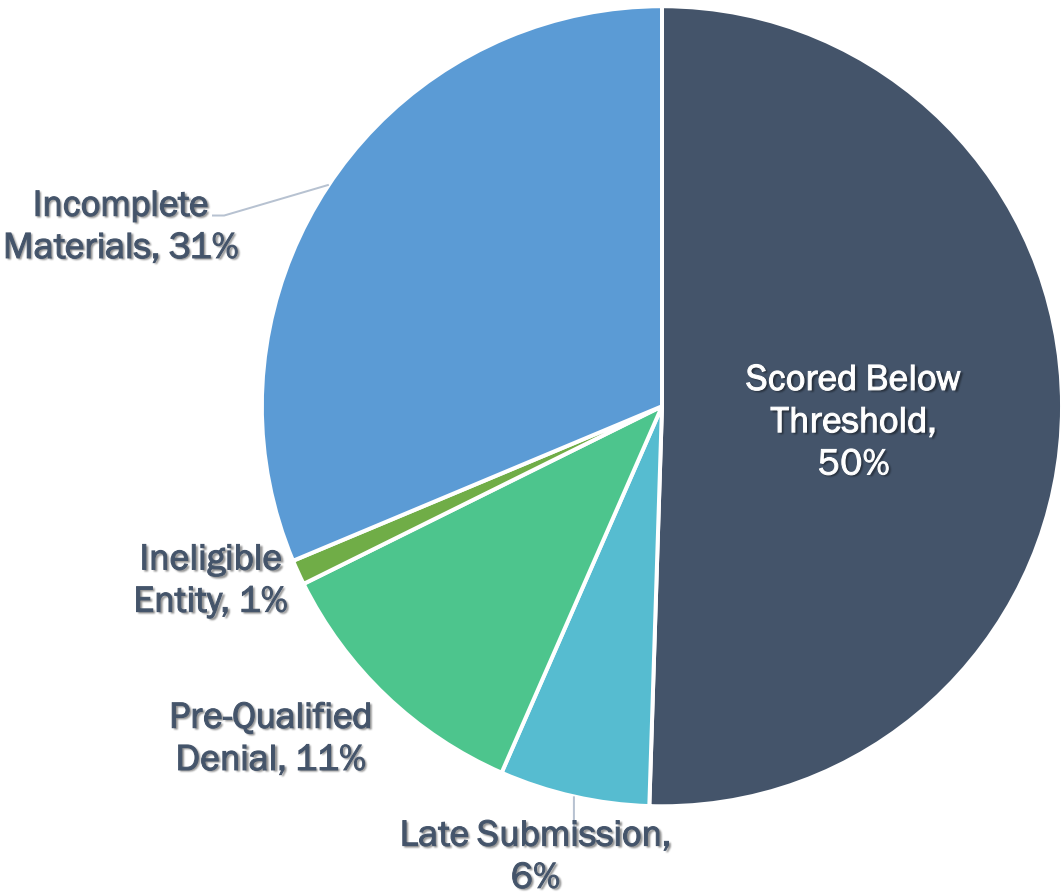
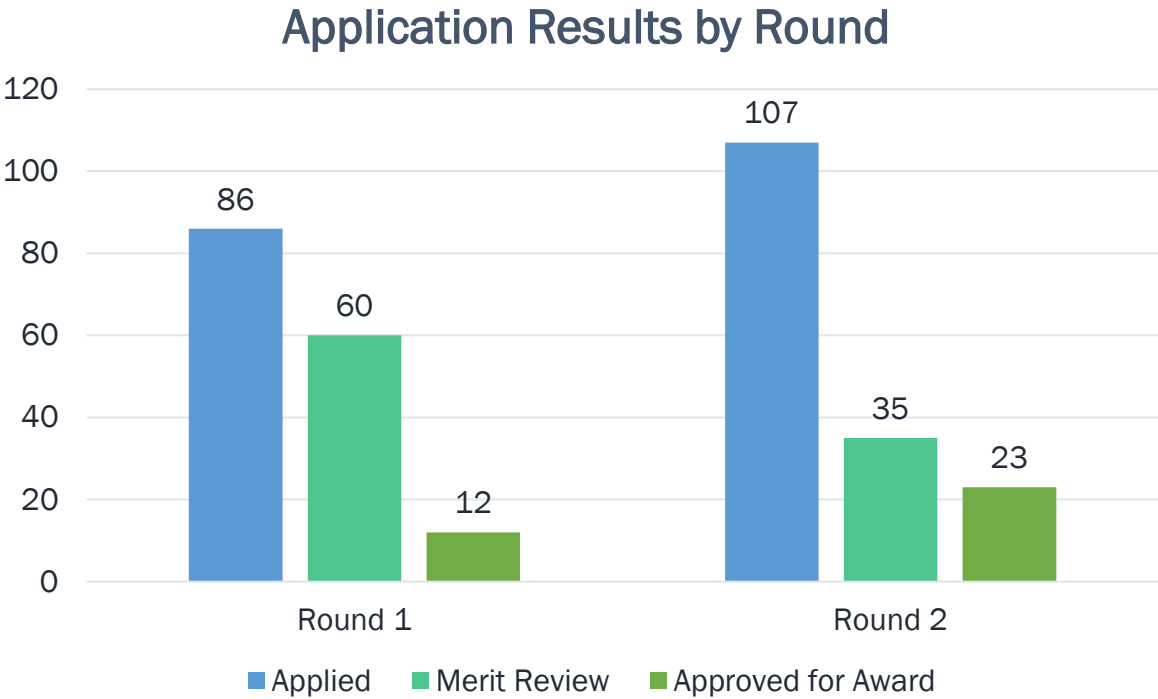

Project Funding



- Funds for EEF are disbursed based on project milestones determined during the negotiation process.
- Each milestone is connected to a critical decision point in the project.
- An agreed upon percentage of funds will be disbursed upon completion of each milestone until all milestones are completed.

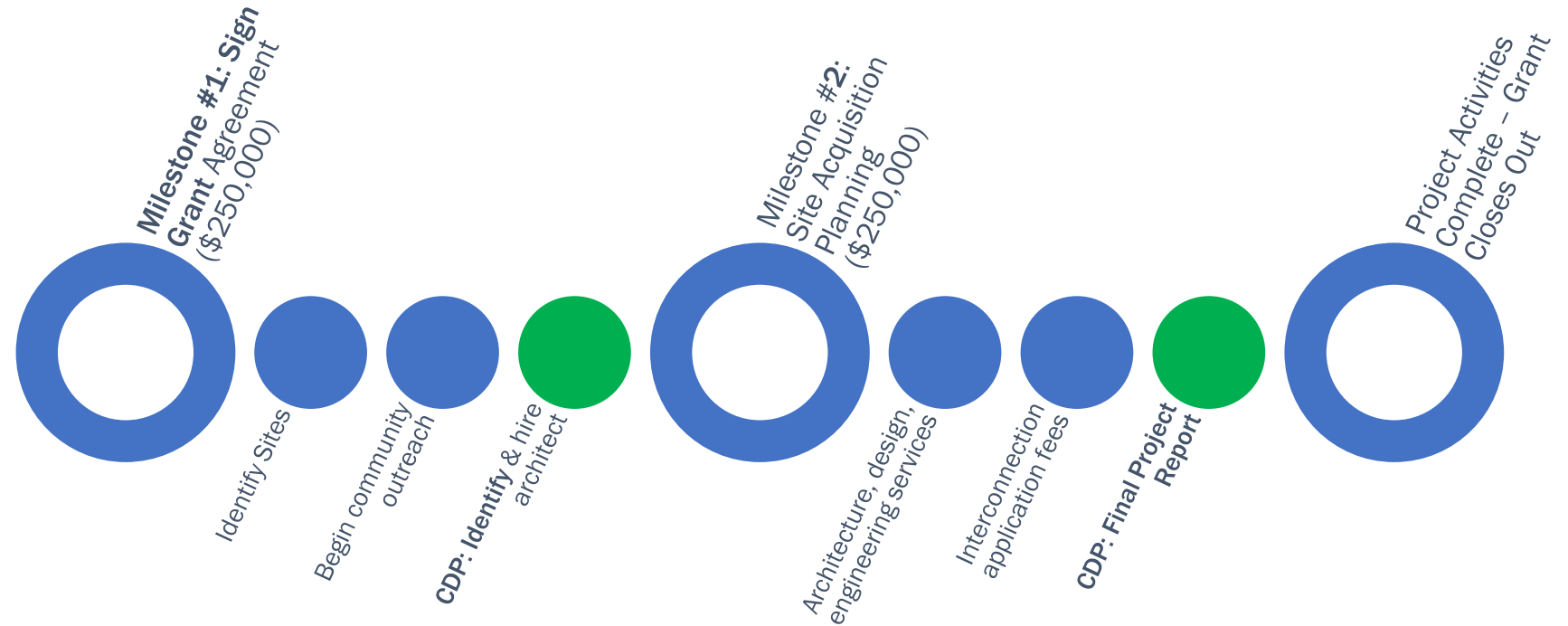

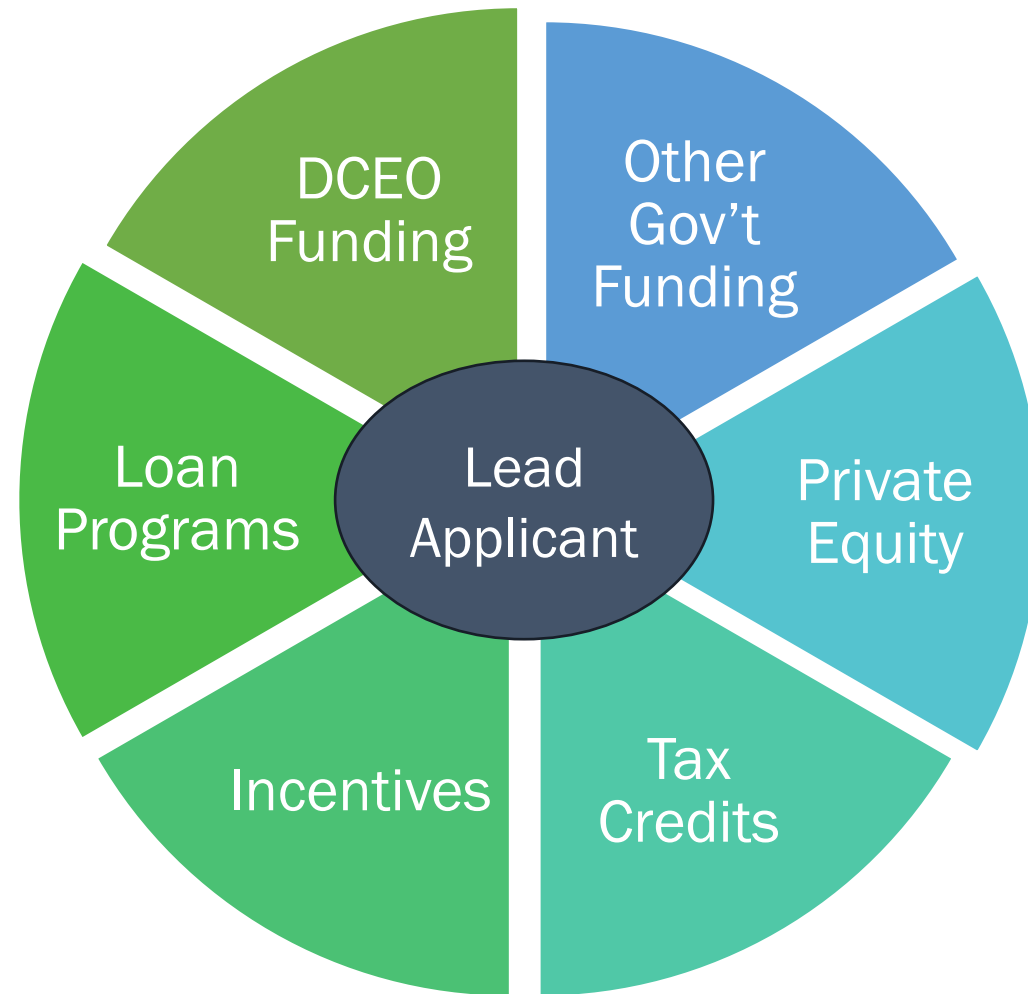


Building the Capital Stack

- Hard deadline!
 - If 5:00pm is the deadline, then 5:01pm is ineligible
 - Plan to submit at least a day in advance, leaving time to resolve any technical difficulties.

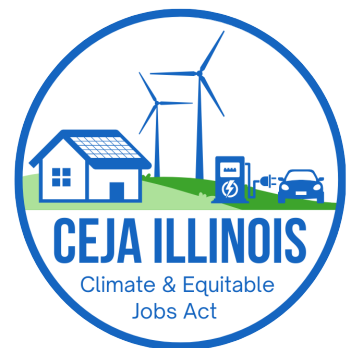

Conflict of Interest Disclosure

Uniform Grant Application

Conflict of Interest Disclosure

Award applicants and recipients of awards from the State of Illinois (collectively referred to herein as "Grantee") must disclose in writing to the awarding State agency any actual or potential conflict of interest that could affect the State award for which the Grantee has applied or has received. See 30 ILCS 708/35; 44 Ill. Admin Code § 7000.40(b)(3); 2 CFR § 200.112. A conflict of interest exists if an organization's officers, directors, agents, employees and/or their spouses or immediate family members use their position(s) for a purpose that is, or gives the appearance of, being motivated by a desire for a personal gain, financial or nonfinancial, whether direct or indirect, for themselves or others, particularly those with whom they have a family business or other close associations. In addition, the following conflict of interest standards apply to governmental and non-governmental entities.

Definitions:

Governmental Entity. If the Grantee is a governmental entity, no officer or employee of the Grantee, member of its governing body or any other public official of the locality in which the award objectives will be carried out shall participate in any decision relating to a State award which affects his/her personal interest or the interest of any corporation, partnership or association in which he/she is directly or indirectly interested, or which affects the personal interest of a spouse or immediate family member, or has any financial interest, direct or indirect, in the work to be performed under the State award.

Non-governmental Entity. If the Grantee is a non-governmental entity, no officer or employee of the Grantee shall participate in any decision relating to a State award which affects his/her personal interest or the interest of any corporation, partnership or association in which he/she is directly or indirectly interested, or which affects the personal interest of a spouse or immediate family member, or has any financial interest, direct or indirect, in the work to be performed under the State award.

The Grantee shall also establish safeguards, evidenced by policies, rules and/or bylaws, to prohibit employees or officers of Grantee from engaging in actions, which create or which appear to create a conflict of interest as described herein.

The Grantee has a continuing duty to immediately notify the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (the "Department") in writing of any actual or potential conflict of interest, as well as any actions that create or which appear to create a conflict of interest.

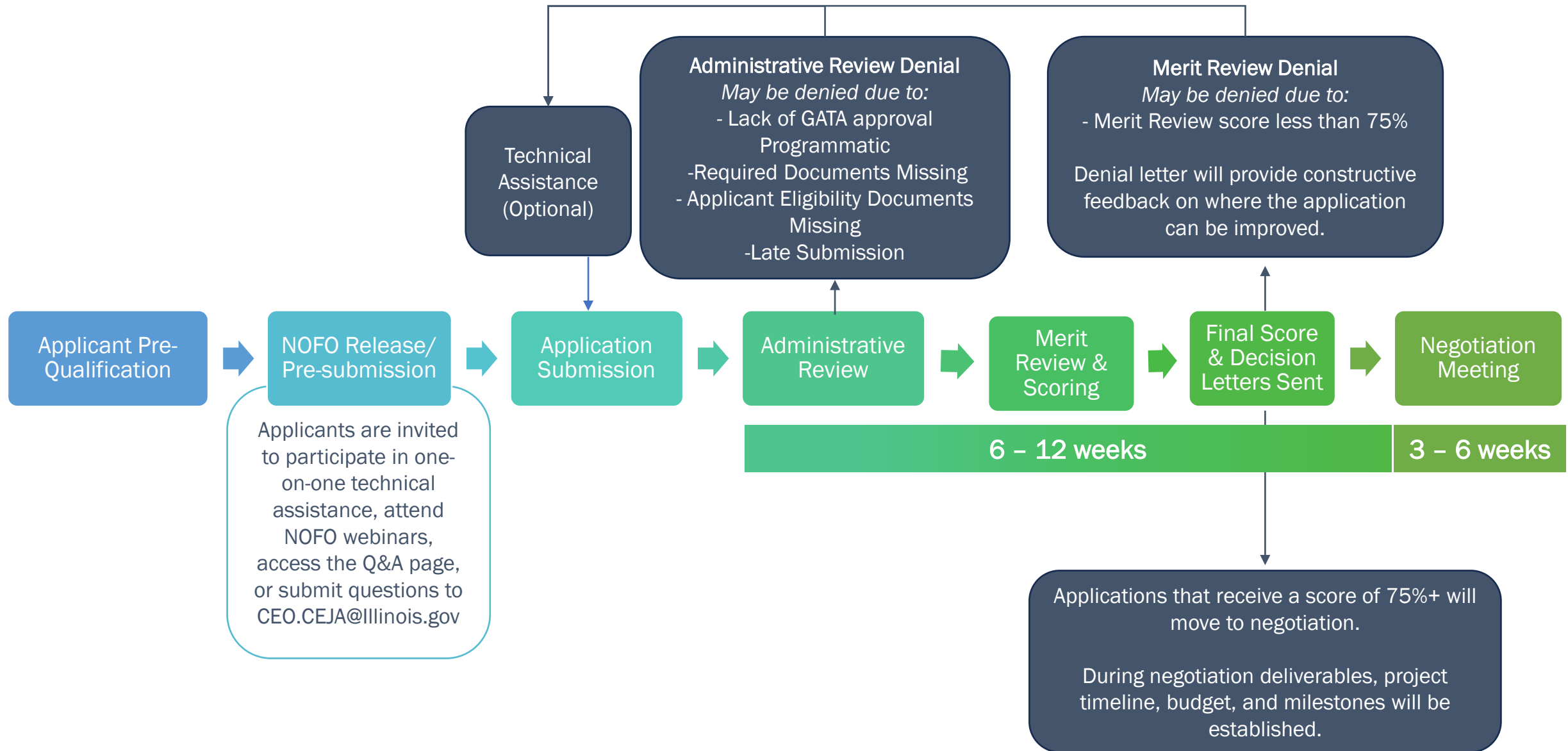

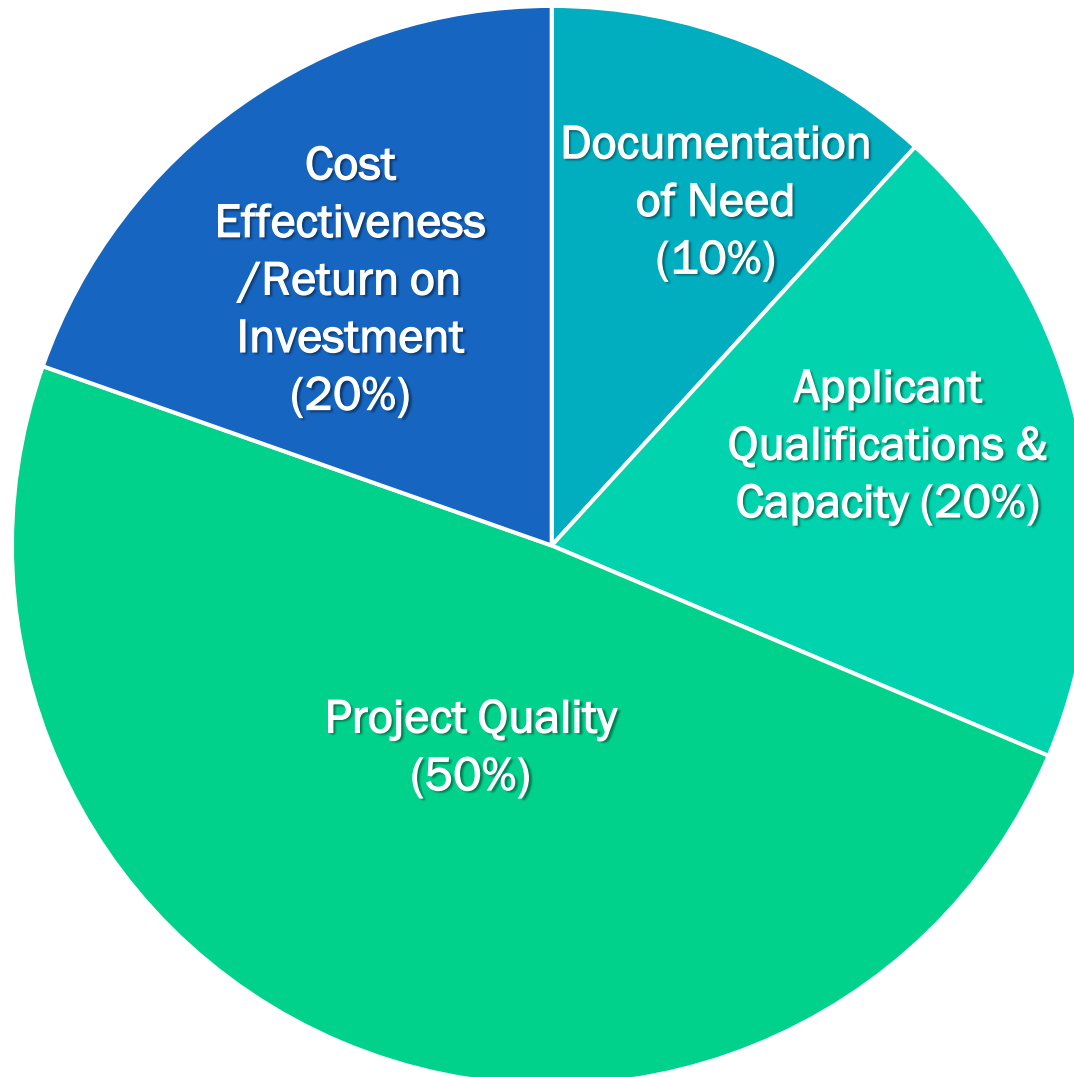

Be Specific

Every time you make a claim, back up with documentation of need, outcomes, metrics, etc.

Example: Include labor and economic impact of partners or collaborators, List funding sources, etc.

Don't Assume

While merit review teams are composed of community, funding sources or other stakeholders, they are not your family member, or colleague unattainable application that are not clear or need explanation.

Example: If you name a partner organization, explain why you are doing so; If your team plans to apply for funding, explain the type of funding etc.; if the equipment etc. the budget narrative should be utilized etc.

Grant Writing Tips for the Equitable Energy Future Grant Program Updated June 2025

Center the Community

Renewable energy and energy efficiency projects have an array of possible energy and non-energy benefits, but not every community is the same. Throughout the application think about how this project will address the specific needs of your community and how this project will address those.

It's also important for applicant to think about community-based partners, vendors, contractors, and collaborating organizations. How can the applicant demonstrate a connection to those also embedded in the community. This may be by co-hosting events, attending public meetings, providing information on each other's websites or social media etc. These formal or informal partners can help with community connection or data that can be helpful for the applicant when demonstrating community need and/or potential impact of the project.

Outline Your Plan

This program was designed for projects that are in the early stages. As a result, merit review teams expect that not every detail of a plan will be worked out and know that as the project progresses plans may change. However, it is still important to outline your plans as much as possible even if details are not solidified. You may even go as far as stating "this is our plan based on these factors, but we acknowledge this may change based on ~~xxx~~". Leaving information general because it is not solidified can be perceived as not having a plan or that there has been minimal thought put into the plan. Any details or estimates can be helpful to understand that while the plan may not feature exact dates your team has spent time on thinking through potential details and timelines.

Example:

General - Demonstrates intent but not thoughtful planning:

We plan to do community outreach with community members throughout all stages of this project.

Detailed- Demonstrates the plan was thought through even if some aspects may not be final:

Based on our current estimated timeline we anticipate that community outreach will begin once rezoning has been approved and will continue into the implementation phase. Our organization and partners have found one-on-one in-person outreach to be the most effective. As a result, we will attend public meetings, seek co-hosts for community awareness events, and work with local organizations such as the Chamber of Commerce and our local economic development board to increase awareness of the project. We are still actively seeking partners and identifying events that would reach the highest number of potential customers. As the project advances into the construction phase, we anticipate contracting a marketing professional to incorporate digital and social media outreach in addition to ongoing in-person events to increase our reach to those who may have barriers to meeting our team in-person.

Be Consistent

Prior to submitting your grant application read all application materials with a focus on identifying inconsistencies. Inconsistencies can make project details confusing potentially leading to a lower score.

Example: Are the costs outlined on the Program Specific Application also in the Uniform Budget Template? Are employment numbers in the Program Specific Application consistent with those outlined in the Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Access Plan?
