





Climate & Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA)








CEJA Equity Focus




What is Community Solar?

"Any solar project or purchasing program, within a geographic area, in which the benefits flow to multiple customers such as individuals, businesses, nonprofits and other groups"

What is Equitable Community Solar?



Equitable Community Solar Projects provide direct, tangible benefits to and involvement of the local community and have a specific focus on underserved/disadvantaged communities.

The Community Solar Energy Sovereignty (CSES) Grant Program is one of the two grants funded under the Jobs & Environmental Justice Grant Fund

CSES offers pre-development funding to support the development of community solar projects.

The goal of CSES is to remove barriers to project, community & business development caused by lack of capital.

Community-Based Organizations

Must fit the definition outlined by the National Community-Based Organization Network (NCBON) in the Illinois Power Agency's 2022 Long Term Plan:

- A. The majority of the governing body and staff consists of local residents,
- B. The main operating offices are in the community,

C. Priority issue areas are identified and defined by residents,

- D. Solutions to address priority issues are developed with residents, and
- E. Program design, implementation, and evaluation components have residents intimately involved, in leadership positions.

Public Entity

A public entity may qualify as a community-based organization, but only if the public entity meets the following requirements:

- A. The public entity must represent a municipality or county (or school district, park district, etc.)
- B. The public entity must certify that no local community-based organizations exist that can fill this role.
- C. The public entity must provide the same showing of robust community engagement as a non-public entity would be required to show.

Technical Service Providers directly working with a CBO

Technical service providers as defined in the CEJA Section 5-60 (e) (4) working in direct partnership with community-based organizations (as defined above).

A. The entity must demonstrate robust community engagement and support.

B. A technical service provider can be a solar supplier or installer or business involved in the field of solar energy.


Funding

• Total Funding: \$8.5 million per year

- Per Applicant Award: \$50,000 \$1,000,000
- Estimated Number of Awards: Up to 40
- Applicants may apply for multiple projects. However, applicants will only be approved for a total award amount of funds up to \$3 million between all projects.
- Applicants may apply for both CSES and EEF. However, they can only receive a maximum award between EEF and CSES of up to \$3 million.

Priority projects are those that are located in or support an equity investment eligible community.

- Environmental Justice communities
- Restore. Reinvest. Renew (R3) communities





Project Funding



- Funds for CSES are disbursed based on milestones determined during the negotiation process.
- Each milestone is connected to a critical decision point in the project.
- An agreed upon percentage of funds will be disbursed upon completion of each milestone until all milestones are completed.






Building the Capital Stack


Applicants must demonstrate how they plan to fund their project.

CSES funds only cover a portion of project funds.

Applicants are encouraged to explore other available funding opportunities through DCEO, other state agencies, federal support, loans, incentives, private equity etc.



Project Scenario: Non-profit organization, Net Zero/Near Net Zero Retrofit, located in and/or serves EJ/R3/DAC, mixed use commercial/residential building with market rate and low-income tenants

- Grant funds will be disbursed upon approval of expenditure reports
