Illinois is investing in clean energy sources, electric vehicles, and energy efficiency.


Some groups of people and communities benefit more from clean energy investments. Some suffer more from environmental impacts and community disinvestment.




The benefits of clean energy investments and good-paying clean energy jobs should be distributed equitably.

Energy Transition Navigators Program

- **Goal:** Conduct outreach and education to raise awareness of CEJA programs, recruit participants, and build connections
- Areas accepting applications: Champaign and Kankakee*
- Deadline: 11/ 1/ 2024 before 5:00 pm Central






Clean Jobs Workforce Network Program -"Workforce Hubs"

- Goal: Prepare people for good-paying, entry-level clean energy jobs.
- What: Clean jobs training, utilizing a standard clean energy curriculum framework
- Where: At least one in each of the 14 regions. Soon accepting applications for Carbondale, Danville, and Peoria with Kankakee* to follow
- Funding: \$37.9 million per year
- Delivered by: Community-based organizations and partners
- Amount per award: \$1 million to \$5 million per year






Successful Workforce Hub applications must submit plans to:

Energy Transition Navigator Program

- Goal: Increase awareness of and participation in CEJA programs
- What: Provide recruitment, enrollment and engagement for CEJA workforce programs
- Where: 14 hubs and surrounding areas throughout the state.
 Soon accepting applications for Champaign with Kankakee* to follow
- Funding: \$6 million per year
- Delivered by: Community-based providers
- Amount per award: \$250,000 to \$600,000 per year



Successful ET Navigator applications must submit plans to:

Coordinate closely with the other CEJA workforce programs (especially Climate Works Pre-apprenticeship and Workforce Hubs)

Provide outreach and community education to raise awareness of and recruit people to participate in CEJA programs (especially Climate Works Pre-apprenticeship and Workforce Hubs).


Provide services to help people enroll and participate in the programs.

Engage with diverse community, employer, and workforce stakeholders to advance workforce program goals.

Preparing a Strong Application





Preparing a Strong Proposal – Overall Tips

Read the NOFO Carefully (multiple times!)

- The notice of funding opportunity contains important information about the expected activities, eligibility criteria, and documents and organizational data needed from prospective partners.
- Be sure that you understand all the requirements.

Submit the NOFO well in advance of the deadline

• Give yourself time for technical assistance and technical issues.

Close reading strategies

- Highlight
- Dissect
- Outline key points
- Ask questions
- Discuss with team



Make sure your organization (or team of organizations) is a good fit

- Does the opportunity align well with your organization's mission and capabilities?
- Are there other organizations that you can partner with to strengthen the application?
- Are you considering staffing, budget, and partnerships?



Preparing a Strong Proposal – Writing Tips

Respond to the requirements of the NOFO

 Your proposed program design should strongly align with the program description and structure Tip: Don't make up your own definitions, terms for the people you will serve, or the type of training you will deliver. Refer to the definitions in the NOFO.

- The review criteria should guide your proposal development
- This is not a creative writing exercise respond according to the application format required by the NOFO

Tell your story

- Highlight the strengths of your team
- Make a case for your project and its potential impact

The Application Review Process

- Step 1: Administrative Review
- Step 2: Merit Review



Step 1: Initial administrative review

- Do you have all required elements of the application package?
- Are you GATA pre-qualified?
- Are you an eligible applicant?
- Did you turn in your application on time?

If you fail this step, your application will not advance to the merit review stage.

Out of fairness to all applicants, DCEO does not accept applications beyond the due date.



Step 1: Initial administrative review Common problems

- Applications were rejected due to lack of GATA pre-qualification, not following directions, missing materials or uploading blank templates.
 - Check and double check the submission requirements. See the checklist in NOFO Section D.2. "Content and Form of Application Submission"
- Applications were rejected because they were submitted late.
 - The submission process takes time, and tech issues happen. Don't wait for the last hour (or the last minute) to submit.



Step 2: Merit review of complete applications


Team of merit reviewers appointed and trained.

Each reviewer reviews applications separately, filling out scoring sheet, comments.

Team meets to discuss discrepancies, adjust scores as needed.

Final reviewer scores for each application are combined into composite score.

Highest scoring application for each region that meets minimum score threshold is selected.



Characteristics of Successful Applications and Common Weaknesses





Qualifications and Capacity (Common weaknesses underlined)

- <u>Staffing plan is clear and complete</u>, reflecting all personnel roles required for program services and administration. <u>Resumes of all</u> key personnel are provided.
- Application narrative <u>specifically describes experience</u> <u>administering similar types of projects</u>.
- Application narrative describes significant experience and capability using an equity lens for program operations.
- Demonstrates ability to form effective partnerships within the region



Documentation of Need

(Common weaknesses underlined)

- Application describes where this project will operate, who the project will serve, as well as their barriers and needs.
- Application describes how <u>local and regional labor market info</u> is used to identify need for clean energy job expansion in the region. Identifies multiple relevant <u>strategies to create connections with</u> <u>local and regional employers</u>.
- Application describes the <u>impact of the project</u> on identified target communities, populations, and growth in clean energy jobs.




Project Plan (Common weaknesses underlined)

- <u>Workplan is detailed and complete</u>. Goals and outcomes align with NOFO requirements.
 - Clean Energy Workforce Hubs: Alignment with Clean Energy Curriculum Framework requirements. <u>Clean Energy Basics is not optional!</u>
- <u>Plan to help participants transition to employment</u> is detailed and complete.
- Plan to address equity in program design and operation is detailed and complete.
- Plan to track outcomes is detailed and complete. The approach to assessing outcomes to improve program delivery is clearly defined.

Budget and Cost Effectiveness (Common weaknesses underlined)

- Thoroughly detailed, itemized budget with justification narrative.
- Thorough <u>analysis of the cost efficiency</u> in relationship to planned program outcomes.
- Application describes <u>multiple leveraged programs</u>, services and partnerships and how they will benefit the program.



TA webinars and one-on-one sessions will provide guidance for improving your application

- Does what you propose conform to the application requirements outlined in the NOFO?
- Is your application package complete?
- Does your team have the capacity and experience to deliver the program? Are roles and responsibilities among partners clearly defined?
- Do you have detailed plans to deliver key elements? The NOFO explains WHAT you'll be delivering. Your proposal explains HOW you'll deliver it, by describing tasks, methods, timeframes, and overall plan.
- Do you have a detailed budget description/narrative?
- Do you demonstrate an understanding of local economy and clean energy job needs?





CEJA Family Feud!

When considering applying for a CEJA Grant, what are the top 5 important questions to ask as it relates to "Who?"



- Who will your program serve?
- Who is your training provider?
- Who are your grant partners?
- Who are your employer partners?
- Who are the important stakeholders who should be brought on to evaluate your program, spread the word?



CEJA Family Feud!

When considering applying for a CEJA Grant, what are the top 5 important questions to ask as it relates to "What?"



- What training will be offered?
- What credentials will participants be working toward?
- What occupations will the training lead to?
- What will the work-based learning be?
- What will be the impact of this work in the community where it is done?



CEJA Family Feud!

When considering applying for a CEJA Grant, what are the top 6 important questions to ask as it relates to "How Much/How Many?"



- How much barrier reduction funding will your participants need?
- How many people will you serve?
- How much is the cost per participant?
- How much funding will your grant request?
- How many jobs will be earned by your participants?
- By how much will their wages increase?
