Recap of BEAD and progress to date



BEAD is a \$42B federal grant program that aims to bring high-speed internet to all Americans

\$42.45 billion

Funds provided for BEAD

The Broadband Equity, Access, and
Deployment (BEAD) Program is a federal
grant program that aims to get all Americans
online by funding partnerships between states
or territories, communities, and stakeholders to
build infrastructure where high-speed internet is
currently unavailable

Program highlights

Eligible entities

- All 50 States, District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico
- Other Territories: U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands

Example eligible uses of funds

- Planning for the deployment of high-speed Internet, including conducting research, collecting data, outreach, and training
- Deploying or upgrading Internet in un/underserved areas
- Improving service to community anchor organizations
- Installing Internet and Wi-Fi in multi-unit residential buildings
- Workforce development, including Registered Apprenticeships and pre-apprenticeships, community college and/or vocational training for broadband-related occupations to support deployment, maintenance, and upgrades



What are the goals of BEAD?



The BEAD Program awarded Illinois \$1.04 billion to connect all unserved and underserved locations to broadband over the next 5 years



Ensure universal coverage across all un/underserved locations in the state, maximizing deployment of end-to-end fiber, and only using non-fiber where fiber costs are extremely high¹



Prioritize projects providing broadband access to unserved and underserved locations and community anchor institutions, Wi-Fi equipment for Multi-Dwelling Units (MDUs) then other digital equity and inclusion priorities²



Run subgrantee selection process within one year of approval of the Initial Proposal, and complete implementation within four years of receipt of funds³



Focus on improving broadband affordability through a low-cost broadband service option, and a middle-class affordability plan⁴



Subgrantee Selection Process Overview

The subgrantee selection process consists of up to three waves, concluding with a final review of all preliminary selections



Focus: hard-to-serve areas

- End-to-end fiber projects are prioritized (as required by BEAD)
- Only the applications including sufficient hard-to serve areas will be processed
- Where there are conflicting applications, the higher scoring application will prevail

Focus: all remaining locations

- The State will determine the cost threshold (EHCPLT) after the application window closes, above which the State may choose to select non-fiber over fiber projects
- Providers will be asked by the State to remove Project Area Units (PAUs) overlapping with other higher-scoring applications

Focus: all remaining locations

- For remaining unserved or underserved areas, applicants will have a final opportunity to submit a proposal
- The State will negotiate coverage for remaining unbid locations

Focus: all preliminary selections

- All preliminarily selected projects will be reviewed to confirm financial, operational, technical, and managerial capabilities
- The State will review preliminarily selected projects to check consistency with prioritization outlined in BEAD Initial Proposal Volume II and BEAD NOFO

Each wave has a series of key steps to determine preliminary selections, and a final review will occur after the completion of the last wave



Steps for applicant

Steps for State of Illinois



Repeat for each wave



Project area selection

Applicants select project areas to apply for, where each Wave considers a wider range of project / technology types



Application submission

Applicants submit **Entity Submission** Form, Project **Submission Form,** and Application **Submission Form** with details on their qualifications and proposed projects



Qualification review & scoring

State determines whether an application meets program qualifications, and scores qualifying projects based on standardized criteria



Preliminary selection

State determines preliminary selections based on NTIAdefined prioritization criteria and application score



Deconfliction

Applicants for remaining applications adjust their proposals to remove preliminarily selected project area units, after which State re-scores and determines additional preliminary selections



Application rollover

State rolls over nonselected applications to the next wave (if not last wave)



Final Review

State reviews preliminarily selected projects to confirm applicant qualifications and consistency in applying selection quidelines




Deep Dive



Project Selection: The PAU Selector Tool allows applicants to select and export PAUs for their applications' proposed project areas

ALL DATA, VISUALIZATIONS, AND PROJECT AREA UNIT CHARACTERISTICS PRESENTED ARE ILLUSTRATIVE AND DO NOT REFLECT FINAL ELIGIBLE LOCATIONS AND/OR PROJECT AREA UNITS



Key features of the PAU Selector Tool


- Visualization of PAUs and their respective statistics (e.g., number and location of unserved, underserved, and served BSLs / CAIs)
- Identification of "High-cost areas," where the 25% match requirement will be waived
- PAUs, of which Wave 1 applications must include a designated portion
- **Search functionality** at the address, ZIP code, or other geographic level, augmented by **live navigation** on the map
- **Export** of selected data to State-standardized CSV files

Project Selection: Each wave has different criteria for eligible applications for preliminary selection



Technology type

Priority Broadband Projects (end-to-end fiber)

Note: While only Priority Broadband Projects will be considered for preliminary selection in Wave 1, projects of all technology types may submit applications for Wave 1 (State will automatically roll over to Wave 2)

Priority Broadband Projects (end-to-end fiber)

Non-Priority, Reliable Broadband Projects <u>if</u> no eligible Priority Broadband Projects are below EHCPLT

Priority Broadband Projects (end-to-end fiber)

Non-Priority, Reliable Broadband Projects <u>if</u> no eligible Priority Broadband Projects are below EHCPLT

Alternative Technology
Projects <u>if</u> no eligible Priority/
Non-Priority Broadband
Projects are below EHCPLT

The State will determine the Extremely High Cost Per Location Threshold (EHCPLT) after the Wave 2 application window

EHCPLT: Threshold above which IOB can decline Priority Broadband Projects in favor of Non-Priority or Alternative Technology Projects

Further guidance on Alternative Technology Project selection may be provided by NTIA at a future date





Application Submission: Applicants must submit three forms to complete an application for Connect Illinois Round 4







Entity Submission Form

Ensures entities applying for Connect Illinois Round 4 meet NTIA BEAD qualification requirements

Project Submission Form

Ensures submitted projects meet NTIA BEAD qualification requirements and collects materials to be reviewed during the Merit Review Scoring Process

Application Submission Form

Serves as the **official submission of the application** to the State of Illinois,
specifying the Entity / Project
submissions to be reviewed by the State

Once per entity, regardless of number of projects to be submitted



Qualification Review & Scoring: All applicants must pass qualification reviews for their application to be scored





Deep Dive



A. Qualification Review: Both the Entity Submission Form and Project Submission Form include mandatory qualifications

Qualifications included in pre-qualification phase

Qualifications not included in pre-qualification phase

Entity application qualifications



















Qualifications approved during the pre-qualification process generally do not need to be resubmitted, but the State reserves the right to re-assess the qualifications, capabilities, and resources of all prospective subgrantees

Project application qualifications













Regardless of pre-qualification status, all applicants must submit project-based qualification materials

B. Scoring: Applications meeting qualification requirements will be scored against NTIA-approved criteria

Primary¹

Criteria	How it will be applied	Score Percent
Minimal BEAD Program outlay: non-State match	More points will be assigned to the degree of non- State match over 30%, as a greater non-State match signifies more "skin in the game" and therefore financial risk assumed by the applicant	20%
Minimal BEAD Program outlay: financial need with respect to reference cost	Points will be assigned based on how much the application's required BEAD outlay deviates from the reference cost published by the State. More points will be assigned to applications with lower BEAD outlay compared to the reference cost	30%
Affordability	Applicants will be scored based on the price they offer for either 1Gbps/1Gbps or 100/20Mbps: 1Gbps/1Gbps for Priority Broadband Projects and 100/20Mbps for other broadband projects	15%
Fair Labor Practices	Applicants will be scored based on their demonstrated record of and plans to be in compliance with federal labor and employment laws, and submission of a Project Labor Agreement	15%

Secondary / addi		Score	
Criteria	How it will be applied	Percent	
Speed to deployment	Points will be assigned for enforceable deployment plans faster than 48 months	3%	
Speed of Network & Technical Capabilities	Points will be assigned based on performance levels and scalability of networks	4%	
Open Access	Points will be assigned based on subgrantee's provision of open access	3%	
Local Coordination	Points will be assigned based on the breadth and depth of community support for the project (5%) and financial investment by community members and organizations (5%)	10%

Additional details for each scoring criteria available in the State of Illinois Initial Proposal Volume II

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^{1.} I.e., BEAD-stipulated criteria that must collectively account for no less than 75% of total points

^{2.} I.e., Other BEAD-stipulated criteria (Speed to Deployment, Speed of Network and Technical Capability), and additional criteria (Open Access, Local Coordination) that are not required but encouraged per the BEAD NOFO



Preliminary Selection: The BEAD program prioritizes projects based on technology type per NTIA requirements

Degree of prioritization (high to low) per BEAD requirements



Reliable Broadband Service: Priority Broadband Project

End-to-end fiber-optic facilities to each end-user premise



Reliable Broadband Service: Non-Priority, Qualifying broadband

E.g., Cable modem / hybrid fiber-coaxial technology, terrestrial fixed wireless technology using licensed spectrum



Alternative technologies

E.g., Unlicensed Fixed Wireless (ULFW), Low-Earth orbit satellite (LEO)

Key takeaways

BEAD stipulates **Priority Broadband Projects (end-to-end fiber) be prioritized** over non-Priority
Broadband Projects for subgrantee selection

Non-Priority, Reliable Broadband Service

Projects may be considered if there are no Priority

Broadband Project bids below the EHCPLT, or no

Priority bids at all in a given area

Alternative technologies similarly may be considered if there are no Priority and non-Priority Reliable Broadband Project bids below the EHCPLT

When a PAU receives more than one eligible application, **BEAD stipulates the use of the State's defined competitive scoring process**



Preliminary Selection: Per NTIA guidance, applications will be preliminarily selected based on technology, score, and the EHCPLT

Preliminary selection process - Illustrative





Deconfliction: The deconfliction process can lead to three potential outcomes for applicants

When does deconfliction occur?

All qualifying applications will be **ranked by score**

Applications that have the highest score for the given PAU(s) and are above the State's scoring threshold will be preliminarily selected

Deconfliction will occur for all remaining applications that overlap with preliminarily selected projects (i.e., those scoring lower than preliminarily selected projects for the same PAU(s))

Resubmitted / remaining applications are re-scored, re-ranked, and reviewed for preliminary selection

Option 1. Overlap with preliminarily selected project on a "must-include" PAU, i.e., a PAU identified by an applicant as necessary for the application to be viable		Applicant is notified which PAU(s) overlap with a preliminarily selected project, and given 10 business days to submit an application among remaining PAUs originally applied for,	
Option 2.	No overlap with preliminarily selected project on a "must-include" PAU	or withdraw the application from the Wave	
	Overlap with preliminarily selected project on 10+% of applied-for BSLs		
Option 3.	No overlap with preliminarily selected project on a "must-include" PAU	State directly de-scopes the application using reference cost	
	Overlap with preliminarily selected project on less than 10% of applied-for BSLs		





Deconfliction: Illustrative example of deconfliction process

Examples are non-exhaustive and do not demonstrate all possible outcomes

Highest score among all apps and highest score for given PAU set – *preliminarily* selected

App 2 (90/100):
 Next highest score among all apps AND <10% of BSLs overlap with preliminary selection (App 1) – auto-deconflicted and rescored as 87/100, preliminarily selected

App 3 (85/100): 10+% BSLs overlap with preliminary selection (App 2) – 10 business days to deconflict



Post-deconfliction



- App 3* (80/100):
 Resubmitted application is rescored (80/100) and is highest score for given PAU set preliminarily selected
- App 4:
 Decides to withdraw application from this
 Wave and wait for next
- App 5 (75/100):

 No overlap & highest score for given PAU set *preliminarily selected*

Deep Dive



Application Rollover: Applications not selected in a given wave may automatically roll over to the next wave

Potential application outcomes



- Application is preliminarily selected
- Application is not selected and does not conflict with a preliminary winner

Application is not selected and conflicts with a preliminary winner

Application not qualified and thus not scored



Potential applicant actions for next wave

Coordinate with State on any final review as needed

Application automatically rolled over

- Resubmit updated application as desired (e.g., revise BEAD outlay downward, revise match upward)
- Submit new application(s) for additional PAUs if desired

Application not automatically rolled over

- Reduce application scope to exclude conflicting PAUs to participate in next Wave
- Submit new application(s) for additional PAUs if desired

Application not automatically rolled over

Address comments in new application for next Wave





Final Review: After all waves conclude, preliminary selections will be reviewed to confirm qualifications and adherence to guidelines

The State will conduct two review processes:

Confirmation of applicant and project capabilities

Final confirmation of financial, operational, technical, and managerial qualifications based on full set of awarded PAUs

If concerns remain after engaging with preliminarily selected applicant, State reserves the right to select alternative proposals

Confirmation of overall preliminary selection consistency with BEAD criteria

If there is one application that is a Priority Broadband Project that satisfies Connect Illinois Round 4 requirements and is within the EHCPLT, application will be default winner

If there are two or more applications that are Priority Broadband Projects that satisfy Connect Illinois Round 4 requirements and are within the EHCPLT, the standard scoring criteria will apply

If there is no application that is a Priority Broadband Project that satisfies Connect Illinois Round 4 requirements and is within the EHCPLT, AND if Non-Priority Broadband Projects cover the same area, the standard scoring criteria will apply


