What is the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, or CEJA?

A few of CEJA's Main Goals



Reach 40% renewable energy by 2030, 50% by 2040, 100% by 2050.



Achieve a carbon-free power grid by 2045, closing all fossil-fuel power plants.



Equitably grow the clean energy workforce to meet the demand for clean energy technologies and services.



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CEJA equitable workforce development

Illinois is investing in clean energy sources, electric vehicles, and energy efficiency.

Some groups of people and communities benefit more from clean energy investments. Some suffer more from environmental impacts and community disinvestment.

 The benefits of clean energy investments and good-paying clean energy jobs should be distributed equitably.

We need to expand the clean energy workforce to do the work.

Clean Jobs Workforce Network Program, "Workforce Hubs"

- Goal: Prepare people for good-paying, entrylevel clean energy jobs.
- What: Clean jobs training, utilizing a standard clean energy curriculum framework
- Where: 13 hubs throughout the state.
- Funding: \$24 million/year + \$15 million barrier reduction services/year
- Delivered by: Community-based organizations* and partners

Climate Works Pre-apprenticeship Program

- Goal: Prepare people for apprenticeship programs in construction & building trades
- What: Construction training, with a clean energy focus
- Where: 3 centers throughout the state
- Funding: \$10 million/year + \$6 million barrier reduction funds/year
- Delivered by: Community-based organizations* and partners

Energy Transition Navigator Program

- Goal: Increase awareness of and participation in CEJA programs
- What: Provide recruitment, enrollment and engagement for CEJA workforce programs
- Where: 13 hubs and surrounding areas throughout the state
- Funding: \$6 million/year
- Delivered by: Community-based providers and partners

Returning Resident Clean Jobs Training Program

- Goal: Prepare returning residents for good paying, entry-level clean energy jobs.
- What: Provide training, utilizing standard clean jobs curriculum framework.
- Where: Illinois Department of Corrections facilities
- Funding: \$6 million/year
- Delivered by: Community-based providers and partners

Who will programs serve?

Although eligibility varies by program, generally, the programs will serve:

- People living in equity investment eligible communities (environmental justice or R3 communities)
- Formerly convicted persons or current/former members of foster care
- Displaced energy workers and their dependents

Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program

- Goal: Help businesses grow and build capacity to do clean energy projects
- What: Provide funds, services, and support to contractor businesses
- Where: 13 regional contractor incubators throughout Illinois
- Funding: \$21 million/year
- Delivered by: Community-based organizations and partners



Clean Energy Primes Contractor Accelerator Program

- Goal: Help businesses grow and build capacity to do clean energy projects
- What: Provide funds, services, coaching and support to contractor businesses
- Where: 3 regional accelerators provide services throughout Illinois
- Funding: \$9 million/year
- Delivered by: Community-based organizations and partners



Equitable Energy Future Grant Program

- Goal: Remove barriers to clean energy project, community, and business development caused by a lack of capital.
- What: Provide seed funding and pre-development opportunities for equity eligible contractors.
- Where: Throughout Illinois
- Funding: \$34 million/year
- Delivered by: DCEO



The four workforce training programs will work together to engage employers, industry leaders, and union apprenticeships to facilitate job placement.



The Energy Transition Navigators are the connectors. They help connect people and communities to the CEJA programs by providing information and outreach.



While the Returning Resident Program provides training inside prisons, participants will need support on the outside, too. Coordination with the other CEJA workforce programs will help facilitate job placement, wrap-around supports, and additional training.



Workforce training program graduates may want help to grow their businesses and careers. Workforce programs can connect them to contractor programs to support their growth.

Climate and Equitable Jobs Act

The Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (CEJA, P.A. 102-0662) was signed into law by Governor Pritzker on September 15, 2021. CEJA is comprehensive energy legislation that

- Incentivizes renewable energy development;
- Accelerates electric vehicle (EV) adoption and expands charging station infrastructure;
- Creates statewide clean energy workforce training programs to ensure our workforce is prepared for the jobs of the future; and,
- Supports communities facing energy transitions and much more.

DCEO's role in CEJA is to help Illinois' workforce prepare for and train for jobs in the clean energy industry and to provide support to workers and communities facing plant closures. These programs prioritize Illinoisians who live in communities that have historically faced economic barriers and environmental damage, bolstering a diverse workforce in the clean energy industry. DCEO is charged with implementing many programs under CEJA. Click on the links below to learn more.

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How do the CEJA Workforce Programs connect to the larger workforce ecosystem?



Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act (WIOA)



WIOA is designed to strengthen and improve our nation's public workforce system. Its goal is to help American youth and people with significant barriers to employment get high-quality jobs and careers as well as funding for training. WIOA also assists employers with hiring and keeping skilled workers.

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WIOA Core Four Partners

- Title I: Adult, Dislocated Worker, and Youth programs (DCEO) employment and training services
- Title II: Adult education and Literacy (ICCB) assist adult learners improve their basic literacy skills, obtain a high school equivalency certificate, improve their English language acquisition, and transition to postsecondary education or workplace training in order to obtain sustainable employment.

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WIOA Core 4 Partners (cont.)

 Title III: Wagner-Peyser Employment Services (IDES) – providing services including job search assistance, help getting a job referral, and placement assistance for job seekers. Additionally, reemployment services are available for UI claimants, as well as recruitment services to employers with job openings.

 Title IV: Vocational Rehabilitation Program (IDHS) – provide training, adaptive equipment, job placement, and direct support services to persons with disabilities who require assistance in achieving or retaining competitive integrated employment.

Community Based Organizations are key partners and offer:

- Deep connections with the people of the community
- Thorough knowledge of community needs
- Provision of services that support community members' needs
- Ability to identify resources and connect people to those resources
- Connections to other networks of community organizations



Connecting to Unions through Apprenticeships



Employers have access to well-trained workers.

Apprenticeships reduce worker turnover, build loyalty.

Employees benefit from skill gains and income throughout training period.

Offer workers a way to start new careers with good wages.

Helps match employers to employees to determine if it's a good fit.



The problem: For many, apprenticeships are out of reach



Solution: Clean Energy Pre-apprenticeships

Specifically target equity-focused populations and equity eligible communities

Prepare participants to enter and succeed in apprenticeships

Provide access to educational and career counseling and other supportive services and tutoring

Offer hands-on, meaningful learning activities

Provide support for applying to and transitioning into an apprenticeship program



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What Are Clean Energy Jobs?

- Jobs in the solar energy, wind energy, energy efficiency, energy storage, solar thermal, green hydrogen, geothermal, electric vehicle industries, other renewable energy industries
- Industries achieving emission reductions
- Related industries that manufacture, develop, build, maintain, or provide ancillary services to renewable energy resources or energy efficiency products or services
- Industries that manufacture and install healthier building materials that contain fewer hazardous chemicals.
- Administrative, sales, other support functions within these industries.
