Purpose and Objective

DCEO is seeking information from stakeholders to inform the Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program implementation.

Background

On September 15, 2021, Governor JB Pritzker signed the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act (P.A. 102-0662, referred to herein as "CEJA") into law, designed to equitably transition the state to 100 percent clean energy by 2050. As part of this, the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) is responsible for implementing programs to prepare the Illinois workforce for the transition to clean energy and to support Illinois communities undergoing energy transitions, including:

- Clean Jobs Curriculum
- Climate Works Preapprenticeship Program
- Returning Residents Clean Jobs Training Program Energy Transition Workforce Commission
- Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program

Scope and Objective: Input on the Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program

This request for public information (RFI) seeks input on the Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program, which was established by CEJA and will be implemented by DCEO. The Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program (20 ILCS 730/5-45) will provide access to business development resources and support for small clean energy businesses and contractors in Illinois. The program focuses on providing services to the owners of clean energy contractor businesses and nonprofits in environmental justice communities. Other clean energy contractor business owners are eligible as well.

Program services will be delivered through a network of 13 program delivery hub sites located in or near each of these areas: Chicago (South Side), Chicago (Southwest and West Sides), Waukegan, Rockford, Aurora, Joliet, Peoria, Champaign, Danville, Decatur, Carbondale, East St. Louis, and Alton. Through a competitive process, DCEO will select and fund eligible community-based organizations to operate each hub site. Community-based organizations delivering the program may directly provide all services or subcontract to other entities to provide portions of program components.

For this program, "eligible community-based organization" means a nonprofit organization, including an accredited public college or university, that has experience providing business-related assistance and support for entrepreneurs; has knowledge of construction and clean energy trades; demonstrates relationships with residents and organizations serving the community; and demonstrates the ability to serve diverse and underrepresented populations effectively.

The Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program will:

Facilitate access to low-cost capital for small clean energy businesses and contractors;

- Provide support for obtaining business services, including, but not limited to, bonding; backoffice services; insurance, permits, training, and certifications; business planning; and lowinterest loans;
- Train, mentor, and provide other support needed to allow participant contractors to build capacity, expand their markets, and grow their businesses;
- Ensure that the participating and potential contractor clients and community partners are engaged in the Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program;
- Connect participant contractors with the Department of Labor for resources, training, and technical support on prevailing wage compliance;
- Provide recruitment and ongoing engagement with entities that hire contractors and subcontractors, programs providing renewable energy resource-related projects, incentive programs, and approved vendor and qualified installer opportunities, including, but not limited to, activities such as matchmaking, events, and collaborating with other Hub Sites.

These services will be required to be provided to owners of clean energy contract businesses and nonprofits who meet one or more of the following characteristics (see 20 ILCS 730/5-45(c) for more details):

- Reside in an "equity-investment eligible community," which are communities that are either in an <u>R3 area</u> or an environmental justice community, as defined in CEJA
- Have low educational attainment
- Had prior involvement with the criminal legal system
- Have language barriers
- Graduate of or currently in the foster care system
- Displaced energy worker
- Current or past participant in the Clean Jobs Workforce Network Program, Illinois Climate Works Preapprenticeship Program, or Returning Residents Clean Energy Jobs Training Program

Please note that this RFI is not an application to enter the program or for funding to administer the program. There will be a future Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) released, after which applicants can compete through the process required by the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act (30 ILCS 708) to receive a grant award. Responding to the RFI is not a prerequisite for participating in a future NOFO process and does not obligate DCEO to conduct a future NOFO process based on the responses received. Further, responding to this RFI does not provide any advantages to the participant in any potential future NOFOs.

All information received in a participant's response will be made available for public review and may be used by DCEO to inform the implementation of the Clean Energy Contractor Incubator Program.

It is anticipated that DCEO will issue additional RFIs for the other projects listed above.
